Twin Falls City Council-Public Hearing Procedures for Zoning Requests

1. Prior to opening the first Public Hearing of the session, the Mayor shall review the public hearing procedures.
 2. Individuals wishing to testify or speak before the City Council shall wait to be recognized by the Mayor, approach the microphone/podium, state their name and address, then proceed with their comments. Following their statements, they shall write their name and address on the record sheet(s) provided by the City Clerk. The City Clerk shall make an audio recording of the Public Hearing.
 3. The Applicant, or the spokesperson for the Applicant, will make a presentation on the application/request (request). No changes to the request may be made by the applicant after the publication of the Notice of Public Hearing. The presentation should include the following:
 - A complete explanation and description of the request.
 - Why the request is being made.
 - Location of the Property.
 - Impacts on the surrounding properties and efforts to mitigate those impacts.Applicant is limited to 15 minutes, unless a written request for additional time is received, at least 72 hours prior to the hearing, and granted by the Mayor.
 4. A City Staff Report shall summarize the application and history of the request.
 - The City Council may ask questions of staff or the applicant pertaining to the request.
 5. The general public will then be given the opportunity to provide their testimony regarding the request. The Mayor may limit public testimony to no less than two minutes per person.
 - Five or more individuals, having received personal public notice of the application under consideration, may select by written petition, a spokesperson. The written petition must be received at least 72 hours prior to the hearing and must be granted by the mayor. The spokesperson shall be limited to 15 minutes.
 - Written comments, including e-mail, shall be either read into the record or displayed to the public on the overhead projector.
 - Following the Public Testimony, the applicant is permitted five (5) minutes to respond to Public Testimony.
 6. Following the Public Testimony and Applicant's response, the hearing shall continue. The City Council, as recognized by the Mayor, shall be allowed to question the Applicant, Staff or anyone who has testified. The Mayor may again establish time limits.
 7. The Mayor shall close the Public Hearing. The City Council shall deliberate on the request. Deliberations and decisions shall be based upon the information and testimony provided during the Public Hearing. Once the Public Hearing is closed, additional testimony from the staff, applicant or public is not allowed. Legal or procedural questions may be directed to the City Attorney.
- * Any person not conforming to the above rules may be prohibited from speaking. Persons refusing to comply with such prohibitions may be asked to leave the hearing and, thereafter removed from the room by order of the Mayor.

Request:

Consideration of the request to donate three benches with one plaque located along the Snake River Canyon Rim Trail System.

Time Estimate:

This request will be on the City Council's Consent Calendar

Background:

The City Council approved the modifications to the Parks & Recreation Department's donation policy to allow additional text on inscriptions on July 20, 2009. The policy states

“Any additional text and any inscription for other donations must be directly related to the history of the community, and may identify groups or persons with longstanding ties to the community”.

The Council directed staff to have all requests reviewed by the Parks & Recreation Commission for a recommendation prior to consideration by the City Council. The Commission will need to determine if the additional text meets the conditions stated above. The Commission's recommendation will be forwarded to the City Council concerning their request for additional inscription.

The section in the Donation Policy that deals with inscriptions states:

“Inscription – The text of memorials to individuals may include the name of the person being dedicated to, honored, or memorialized, the dates of the birth and death of that person or the date of the dedication or when honored. Any additional text and any inscription for other donations must be directly related to the history of the community, and may identify groups or persons with longstanding ties to the community.”

Jim and Lorraine Hiskey have requested to donate three benches and one plaque with an enhanced inscription that reads: “Dedication to our beloved parents, Peter and Valna Hiskey and LL Bert and Marian Langdon with gratitude for their incalculable contribution to our lives, families and descendants. Jim and Lorraine Langdon Hiskey, June 2015”. The benches and plaque are proposed to be on the Centennial trail approximately 200' past the first switchback.

At the Parks & Recreation Commission meeting on Tuesday June 9th, the Commission reviewed the request. A motion was made to approve the additional text on the plaque's inscription as part of the benches donation. The motion passed unanimously.

Approval Process:

The City Council requested that all donations be reviewed by the Parks & Recreation Commission, and then forward their recommendation to the City Council for consideration.

Budget Impact:

Only labor cost to install the benches.

Regulatory Impact:

Approval of this request will allow Jim and Lorraine Hiskey to proceed with the placement of three benches and one plaque along the trail system.

Conclusion:

The Parks & Recreation Commission recommends that the Council approve the request for additional text on the plaque's inscription for the Hiskey and Langdon families as part of the benches donation.

Peter Marion Hiskey (1901 – 1986) and Valna Hickman Hiskey (1911 – 1996)

In 1938, near the end of the United States Great Depression a golf course was built along the Snake River in Burley, Idaho. This project was part of President Franklin Delano Roosevelt's Work Public Administrations strategy to give jobs to unemployed Americans.

Peter Marion (Pete) Hiskey signed up. After the course was completed that year he was asked to stay on as a caretaker. Two years later Pete was asked to become the Superintendent of the Twin Falls Municipal Golf Course.

From 1940 to 1950, Pete and Valna, their three boys and daughter lived in a two story stone house, more of a shell, on what is now the tee box of the fifth hole of the TF Municipal Golf Course. Pete, a man of action, quickly got electricity and running water in the house.

The first hole was so close to the house that Pete could step out his front door, walk 15 paces and be on what was then the first hole. The three boys would, at times, jump out the back window onto the putting green.

It was not long before Pete became an authority on golf course turfs, fairway upkeep and beautification. And the "Muni" a nickname for the T. F. Municipal Golf Course had gained a reputation as one of the best courses in Idaho. Pete's reputation grew steadily and caught the attention of the City Manager and the TF leaders who asked him to become the Superintendent of all Parks and Recreation, as well as TF golf course. He held the position until 1950.

While Peter cared for the parks and golf course Valna, his attractive wife cared for the Hiskey household. They were married fifty-four years.

His son Peter Marion II, deceased, went on to win the Idaho State Amateur twice, second son Jimmy won the State Amateur three times, and son Bryant "Babe" also won it three times as well as becoming a PGA Tour winner.

* * * * *

Lambert Lucius "Bert" Langdon (1882–1946) and Marian Orena Smith Langdon (1911–1996)

L. L. "Bert" Langdon was born in Tangent, Oregon, moved to Idaho in 1922. He married Myrtle Munn. The couple had four children, one dying in infancy. He was widely known and respected as a hide broker based in Twin Falls.

While Myrtle was dying of cancer, Marian Orena Smith came to help the family as caregiver, later marrying Bert at age 17. They had five children during and following the Depression era. Bert was an actor and loved community theatre. He also loved fly fishing, often taking his large family overnight camping along the Little Wood River near Ketchum.

Before his untimely death at age 64 he had developed a successful business known as "L. L. Langdon Wool, Furs, Hides, Pelts, New and Used, as well as Scrap Iron and Metals." The iron was a key ingredient in forging steel in the World War II effort.

* * * * *

Marian Smith Langdon (1911- 1996) was born in Jamestown, New York. She immigrated with her family to Bellevue, Idaho, at age four. When Marian was 15 she moved to Twin Falls to care-give for "Bert" Langdon's wife, Myrtle, who was dying of cancer. Their three children, ages 2, 9 and 13 needed care as well.

After Myrtle's death, Bert and Marian entered into a "marriage of convenience," which over the years, developed into one of love and mutual respect. Five more children... three girls, two boys were born.

When Bert died, Marian was 33 years old. Fortunately she had worked alongside him and understood the business. But still it was a daunting task to face the office door each day. It was her strong faith and personal courage that set her on the path to give

her children the proverbial “everything she never had.” And that she did, even getting four of their children through college. As a result, this extraordinary mother of eight, lady welder/businesswoman, community organizer, church woman, Eastern Star leader, PTA mother, President of Business and Professional Women, became the 1952 Idaho State Mother of the Year, as well as Runner-Up to the American Mother of the Year for the United States by the time she was 41 years old. Each of her eight children went on to have productive careers. When she died at age 85 she had twenty-two grandchildren and numerous great and great-great grandchildren who rose up to “Call Her Blessed.” A phrase used by King Solomon to describe an extraordinary woman.

Request:

Consideration of a request to approve the 4th Annual Magic Valley Beer Festival to be held in the Twin Falls City Park on Saturday, August 1, 2015, from 1:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m.

Time Estimate:

Based upon the fact that this is the fourth annual Beer Festival and no police calls for service were generated last year, Staff requests that this item be placed on the Consent Calendar.

Background:

Shayne Carpenter has submitted a Special Event Application requesting to hold the Magic Valley Beer Festival on Saturday, August 1, 2015. The festival is a charitable event to raise money for the Blue Lakes Rotary Club, Senior Center, and the Twin Falls Veterans Council. Watkins Distributing, Tech Distributing, Hayden Distributing and Nouveaux Distributing will be providing the beer. Several other brewers will be supplying beer, which will be provided through the above-listed brewers. Tickets for the event will be \$25.00 in advance, \$30.00 the day of the event, and a \$10.00 fee will be charged for a designated driver. Those purchasing tickets will receive 15 tokens and a 12-ounce plastic beer mug. A two (2)-ounce sample can be obtained with one (1) token and a full mug of beer with five (5) tokens. Additional tokens may be purchased for \$1.00 each.

The area requested for the Beer Festival will be located in the northeast corner of the City Park. The area will be fenced in with only one entrance. Identification will be checked and wristbands will be provided to those purchasing and consuming beer. The event organizers have requested two (2) Twin Falls Police Officers to provide security for the event. The Officers will begin security one (1) hour after the event begins and will stay for one (1) hour after the serving of beer stops at 6:00 p.m. The event organizers will pay the security bill.

There will also be food vendors, and the Senior Center will be providing pretzel necklaces. Jazz, bluegrass and folk/classic rock music will be provided from 1:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m.

The Rotary Club will purchase a Non-Profit Catering Permit which will cover all vendors. The Certificate for Liability Insurance for the event has been provided.

Approval Process:

Consent of the Council

There will be two (2) Twin Falls Police Officers working the event from 2:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. The total cost for security will be \$440.00, which will be paid by the Rotary Club. The Rotary Club will have 60 days from the conclusion of the event to pay the \$440.00 security bill.

Conclusion:

The Twin Falls Police Department Staff and several relevant City Staff members have met and approved this Special Event Application. Based upon this request and the information provided, Staff recommends this event be approved.

The Twin Falls Police Department Staff recommends that the on-duty Patrol Supervisor be given the authority to order the event organizers to mitigate the sound of amplified music. If there are continued noise complaints, disturbances by those participating in the event, and non-compliance, the on-duty Patrol Supervisor shall terminate the event.

Consideration of a request to approve the Festival of Colors Event sponsored by the Krishna Temple, to be held at the Twin Falls City Park on July 25, 2015, from 12:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Time Estimate:

The presentation by Staff will take approximately five (5) minutes, along with any additional time needed to answer questions that the Council may have.

Background:

On January 12, 2015, Kapil Sethi, on behalf of Net Effect Media and the Krishna Temple, Spanish Fork, Utah, submitted a Special Event Application for their Festival of Colors gathering to be held at the north end of the Twin Falls City Park. The Festival of Colors is an ancient Indian tradition which celebrates the arrival of spring and the passing of winter. The festival includes:

- (1) Live Music and Interactive Dance. The performers are listed on their website: <http://www.festivalofcolorsusa.com/festival-of-colors/festival-colors-twin-falls-id/>. The bands perform from 12:00 noon to 4:00 p.m.
- (2) FREE Yoga and Meditation. Free yoga classes will be held during the event and are open to all.
- (3) Color Throws. At the top of the hour every hour (four times) prompted by a countdown (ten to one), everybody throws color in the air. The color is made of cornstarch and is completely harmless. Moreover, it is biodegradable, which means it dissolves in the grass/earth very quickly and easily. The color throw is part of a tradition called 'HOLI' originating from India thousands of years ago welcoming the spring/summer after the winter. A festival that brings happiness and well-being for all.

The event is organized by Net Effect Media, San Jose, California, which is also organizing this event in other Idaho cities, as well as numerous cities in California and Nevada. The organizers will provide a stage (16 feet by 32 feet in size) for live performers, an arts and crafts booth, bounce house, food and water vendor booth, and a vendor booth to sell the "Colors." There will also be a group of EMT's on standby for the event.

Alcohol will not be served at the event nor permitted in the park during the event.

Organizers will provide four (4) private security personnel.

Organizers predict that approximately 400 people will be in attendance for the event.

Request:

Consideration of a request to allow a modified street width on Grandview Drive North between Falls Avenue West and North College Road in connection with Broadmore Subdivision c/o Gerald Martens.

Background:

Broadmore Subdivision is located between Grandview Drive North and Wendell Street, and between Falls and North College Road. The developer has submitted plans for construction of Grandview Drive between Falls Avenue West and North College Road that differ from the 2008 Twin Falls City Transportation Master Plan. The Master Plan calls out for 46' from centerline of dedicated right of way and 31' from centerline to lip of gutter of street construction. Gerald has submitted a request listing five reasons for a modified width of the roadway. The developer is also dedicating the necessary land to meet the 46' from centerline requirement.

Budget Impact:

A future construction cost estimate has been provided by the engineer and the cost would be borne by the City unless the City Council wishes an LID be incorporated on the plat requiring future owners to be responsible for the cost.

Conclusion:

Staff recommends that the Council accept the developers proposal and allow a reduced road width where shown, along with an inclusion on the plat map that all future owners in the platted subdivision will be responsible and unopposed to the development of an LID for the sole purpose of widening the roadway to current requirements at time of widening as determined by the City Engineer.



Please accept this letter as a request to present to the Twin Falls City Council the modified street width design for the section of Grandview Drive between North College Road and Filer Avenue West.

The request is to allow the construction of Grandview Drive to be reduced from a total width of 65 feet to 54.5 feet. The reduction in width is to accommodate an existing electrical transmission line for a majority of the frontage. In support of this request I offer the following facts for consideration.


1. Although Grandview Drive is an arterial route it will terminate approximately 2,000 feet south at the Rock Creek Canyon. Therefore the potential for traffic growth is limited.
2. The proposed plans for Grandview Drive will include turn lanes at Falls Avenue and North College Road, which retains the full capacity of the intersections.
3. The proposed 54.5 foot width is 3.0 feet wider than Falls Avenue West, which was recently reconstructed and is the primary intersecting street. The proposed width accommodates for traffic lanes and a bike path with additional lanes at the intersections.
4. The platting of Broadmore Subdivision will include the full right-of-way so that in the future the right-of-way would be available for widening. All buildings would be set back so that widening, if ever required, could be accomplished without impeding the adjacent property owner.
5. The reduced pavement width will result in maintenance cost savings for the City each year.

Attached is an exhibit showing the proposed roadway and lane configurations.



Request:

Update on the implementation of Phase I of the Bicycle Facilities Plan.

Time Estimate:

Staff will make the presentation, following the presentation, we expect some time for questions and answers. The anticipated total time for presentation and questions is estimated at 20 minutes.

Background:

Staff presented to the City Council last October regarding Phase I of the Bicycle Facilities Map. The City Council approved of the implementation of Phase I and staff said they would start the process in the summer of 2015.

As discussed last October, there are three types of bike facilities:

1. Bike Lane – striped, on-street lanes specially marked as bicycle lanes. There are three existing bike lanes in the community. 1) East side of town, from the City/YMCA pool along Falls Avenue to the top of the grade at Shoshone Falls, 2) West side of town, from North College Road West, south on Sparks to Blake St. N. east on Shoup Avenue West to Harrison St. then north on Harrison to Falls Avenue. There is also a section of this lane that is along Caswell Avenue in front of I.B Perrine Elementary school and Robert Stuart middle school, and 3) South side of town, from the south water tanks, north on Washington St. South to Park Avenue, then west on Park Avenue to Oregon Trail Elementary School, and including a short section on Lois Avenue along the Oregon Trail Youth Complex.
2. Shared Use Path – designated pathways that can be separate from streets, or on the sidewalks of streets. The canyon rim trail system is designated as a shared use path, along with the pathway on Washington St. N. from Falls Avenue to Pole Line Road and the sidewalk along Pole Line Road.
3. Shared Lane Marked – designated streets that are marked with “sharrows” to inform all motorized and non-motorized vehicles that these designated streets are to be shared. Roads designated with sharrows are usually low volume, low speed roads.

The attached map shows where the three bicycle facility types are existing or proposed to be. Care was taken to increase connectivity while keeping bicycle traffic separated from vehicular traffic as much as possible. The map also shows a Phase I boundary, which was included to show how what could be implemented with an initial expenditure of \$20,000. The Phase I boundary was also drawn in an attempt to include as much of the City while enhancing connectivity throughout. It should be recognized that this additional infrastructure will require ongoing maintenance to include regular sweeping and to ensure pavement markings and signs stay visible.

From the 2nd of the Community open houses on the bicycle facilities map, there were several comments that staff agreed that should be reviewed and researched, there were:

1. Education for both motorists and bicyclists
2. Review existing city codes
3. Coordinate with Twin Falls Highway Districts for connections to other communities
4. Move bike lane from Shoup Avenue to Heyburn Avenue
5. Protection for bicyclists – i.e. tubular markers or delineators on bike lane lines
6. Park and Bike areas
7. Ensure sufficient maintenance, sweeping of bicycle facilities regularly
8. Preference of scenic routes over straight routes
9. Controlled intersections at high traffic streets for bicyclists
10. Instead of standardize green guide signs, make them stand out with a unique color

Staff has been focusing on three of those ten items: Number 1, 2 and 7.

1) There are two bicycle education classes scheduled later this summer, they are designed for children and adults 13 years and older.

Thursday July 16th, 6-8pm at CSI

Thursday August 13th, 6-8pm at CSI

Requirements for the class are a working bike and a helmet. The instructors are Sarah Harris with the College of Southern Idaho Sustainability Council and Robin Seastrom of Cycle Therapy

2) Staff held a meeting with members of the bicycle community and discussed the City's current code on bicycling. It was recommended to eliminate the City's code and adopt the State's code on bicycling. Staff has presented to the Parks and Recreation Commission in May concerning this recommendation. The Parks and Recreation Commission unanimously approved of the recommendation. Staff presented to the Traffic Safety Commission in May concerning the same recommendation of eliminating the City's code and adopting the State's code on bicycling. The Traffic Safety Commission at the May meeting recommended to staff to find out what other communities in the state follow the State's code or not and to see if any studies report the state code or the individual communities codes were safer. The Traffic Safety Commission cancelled their June meeting.

#7) Internally, staff has come up with a plan to sweep the bicycle facilities on a regular basis while increasing its frequency.

Starting later this month, staff will be informing the public using different forms of media letting them know what the City is planning to do for Phase I. Josh Palmer, the City's Public Information Officer will discuss some of his plans to communicate with the public. Attached is a poster that is being using to explain to the public what the meaning of sharrows. Phase I consists of three main functions:

1. Striped, on-street lanes specially marked as bicycle lanes
2. Installation of way finding signage, 30 – 40 signs
3. Installation of sharrows on designated streets

The Street Department will start the week of June 22nd applying the sharrows on the designated streets and marking the on-street lanes. It is estimated that it will take up to 10-12 weeks (starting

June 22nd) to accomplish all these tasks. The reason it seems that it will take the Street Department a long time is that starting the week of July 6th, they will have to commit their resources to support the seal coating project which will last 4-5 weeks. After they are completed with that project, they will be able to resume work on installing the sharrows, the way finding signs and the markings for the on-street lanes.

At this time, staff has not had developed what Phase II will be. After Phase I have been installed for a few weeks; staff would like to meet with the biking community again to discuss what the next phase could look like.

Approval Process:

None, staff is only presenting an update to the City Council on the implementation of Phase I of the bicycle facilities plan.

Budget Impact:

The sharrows were purchased out of last year's budget; there are labor costs to install all the markings and signs.



Draft City of Twin Falls Bicycle Facilities Map 2014




